THE LETTER: Laudato Si'


You may/may not have heard the exciting news that the long-awaited film **THE LETTER: LAUDATO SI** has been released. The film is a project of the Vatican Dicastery for Integral Human Development & the Laudato Si Movement. It tells the story of various frontline leaders' journeys to Rome to discuss the encyclical Laudato Si' with Pope Francis. The purpose of the film is to encourage dialogue and action. It's a beautiful documentary and it's hard not to be moved by watching it.

Although the film can be watched individually, you are strongly encouraged to plan a viewing for your parish community. The film runs for 80 minutes but you will need to allow introductory time before and reflection & discussion time afterwards. We are being encouraged to register any viewings at <u>https://theletterfilm.org/</u> so the LS Movement can keep tabs on numbers. There is a lot of information on that website - so much that you can get lost amongst it!



To make it simple, I've downloaded the Event

Agenda document and it's attached separately. It has a suggested outline of a viewing plus a lot of helpful links and excellent discussion points. On page 3, under 'Introduce the film', there are three useful links to documents which are also part of the Resources package but are more easily accessed by these links. BENDIGO ST KILIAN'S launched the Season of Creation on Fathers Day. The Karen community from our parish decorated used ribbons to represent the burning bush witnessed by Moses. Our altar, inspired by Earthcare Parish, Penshurst, drew attention throughout to the season.

Each week, a video was included in the Mass and the Liturgy group embraced the ideas provided by the Earthcare Liturgy Notes.

The parish Facebook page and the Church foyer encouraged engagement in a range of activities as part of the Season. A large pull-up banner listed how St Kilians community could listen to the Voice of Creation and make a difference in choosing to take care of our common home: through awareness, celebrations of the outdoor masses including Blessing of the Animals, prayers, clean-ups, a discussion group which revisited Laudate Si, and a Food truck Festival to raise money as a start-up fund for a parish community garden. An enthusiastic group is now preparing the initial stages of the community garden and will be assisted by the students of St Kilian's and Doxa School (for disengaged youth) in 2023.

VICTOR HARBOUR-GOOLWA PARISH Getting a wiggle on for our common home - from CathNews article!

From a worm farm to recycling, solar panels and sustainable farming, members of the Victor Harbor-Goolwa parish are responding in innova-

tive ways to Pope Francis' call to care for our common home ...

Volunteers purchased purpose-built bins with

good drainage and air holes from the local council. A small box of tiger worms was next on the list and then began the ongoing collection of recycled kitchen waste to feed them ...

After six months of tending the farm, the first batch of worm tea was produced. A natural liquid fertiliser made from soaking worm castings (manure) in water, the worm tea was snapped up by parishioners who were keen to use it in their gardens. Money raised from sales will support projects for those in need... Some parishioners have been so inspired they have also now started their own worm farms."

Other environmental projects include Season of Creation celebrations each September

To raise awareness about recycling a 'What Goes Where?' quiz was held during a Sunday morning cuppa after Mass. Participants were asked to identify assorted items and choose the correct bin for them by following charts/posters. Rubbish containers have been organised in the church areas to be consistent with proper recycling and a Monster Sale of recycled items was very successful. Also, aluminium candle holders and other types of aluminium are being collected and sold locally, with funds raised donated to help the needy.

The parish is reducing its operating costs through the use of solar panels that were installed on the presbytery roof five years ago following a donation from the Social Club.

renew the pledge we took last year. I pledge myself

- To pray with and for Creation.

(This week let us choose one small change in our lives that will deepen our commitment to care for the planet. Perhaps it is to go walking more often in nature, to tend our gardens, perhaps it is to keep soft plastics out of our yellow bins. Perhaps it is to buy goods with the Rainforest Alliance logo. *From little things, big things grow.*

In July, we held a Catholic Earthcare / Laudato Si two-hour event facilitated largely by Alice Carwardine from Earthcare which attracted 30-40 attendees from south east Queensland. We ran out of toner. I then had the bright idea of running it off in black and white. Funnily enough, it's much clearer and easier to read than it was in colour. If we continue printing in black and white, we'll be using less coloured toner, reducing having to get rid of the empty cartridges.

My reason for letting you know is twofold. Firstly, in B&W, it printed much more quickly, saving a bit of electricity. Secondly, the toner cartridges can be hard to recycle. Fuji Xerox does take them back; the school has a recycle bin that FX collects but better we put less in it.

The other thing we use a lot of are AA & AAA batteries – remote controls for air-conditioners, TVs, sound systems, lapel microphones, etc. Bunnings to the rescue! Simply bring your old **batteries** to the collection unit at the front entrance of Bunnings.


A Celebration


We're hoping to start a repair café with the Uniting Church. We have placed a box in the church for people, not able to get to the tip, to leave their junk.

We also had a blessing of the pets. And we have put the Uluru Statement up in the church and followed up with an Information Session.

A herb garden is proposed – accessible to both the church and the street.

NUMURKAH PARISH from Kerry We used the Season of Creation Liturgy notes extensively. Each week, we had an A4 back & front Bulletin Insert with two goals per week. We took most of the content from the Bishops' Office for Justice Ecology & Peace Resources for Laudato Si' Week (idea borrowed from Wendouree Parish!) When we got to the 4th Sunday with Goal 7, we had on the back, a page of "Where to now for our parish?"



FROM THE ENCYCLICAL: "Living our vocation to be protectors of God's handiwork is essential to a life of virtue; it is not an optional or a secondary aspect of our Christian experience." Laudato Si' n 217

In the first chapter of Laudato Si', Pope Francis names the pain we have wrought on our planet: pollution, climate change, a throwaway culture. loss of biodiversity, global inequality, and the issue of water. In response to this devastation, he calls us to integrate personal and social responsibility, spirituality and science, economics, and education.

How might we truly listen to the cry of the earth, the cry of our land? hese cries might arise from the cacophony of birds in our backyards, the scarred earth yielding minerals for our mobile phones, choked bbish receptacles overflowing with poisoned packaging, or the ound of defiled sacred sites of the First Peoples. ubbish re

Would on defined sace of sites of the risk repuise. We are also challenged to listen to the crise sof those voices raised in solidarity with our oceans, land, and sky. They include leaders in the Oceania region whose communities are living with rising sea levels, young people desiring a future in harmony with recetion, First People spiritual leaders inviting us to listen in a spirit of deep inner listening. Are we reflecting on how we can care for biodiversity in our own areas Are we doing enough to support projects that preserve and promote biodiversity? Do we know which flora and fauna species are indigenous to our area? Do we preserve habitat, food and water for local animals birds and insects. Do we understand the vital purpose of wetlands, of indigenous plantings, or the work of Landcare and environmental organisations? Do we remove weed plants from garden beds and grounds and replace with local indignenous plant species? Are we reducing waste, plastic use?

Maybe, if we are still enough, today we will hear the lament of our earth mingled with its songlines, with ancient psalms of praise and with passionate protest.

CELEBRATE the SEASON of CREATION Goal 2 – Hear the Cry of the Poor

FROM THE ENCYCLICAL: ""Strategies for a solution demand an integrated approach to combatting poverty, restoring dignity to the excluded, and at the same time protecting nature." Laudato Si' n 139



The cries of the earth and of the poor have always been intertwined in our land. Sometimes these cries are loud and obvious, for example when floods and fires claim lives and livelihoods however other cries often go unonticed. They include the cries of incarcerated children, sylum seekers held in indefinite detention, of people seeking to escape abusive relationships, and of the First Peoples seeking justice.

Climate change is already affecting low-income households and disadvantaged communities in Australia disproportionately. ACOSS points out that "low-income earners tend to live in areass more likely to be adversely affected by climate change, and have far less ability to move or make other necessary adjustments to their living circumstances. — Few households with low incomes are able to afford significant energy efficiency messures such as insulation, new hot water systems or ninwater tanks. — Energy comsumption in low income households is jap tily shaped by the market in aecond-hand appliances. Many second-hand appliances are ineffi-cient, waste energy and increase bills." cient, waste energy and increase bills.

Are we oting advocacy poportunities on sisues including (innate change, refugees, local & global rty, First Nations justice? Are we using slavery-free products?
